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**PANCREATIC CANCER ACTION NETWORK (PanCAN) LAUNCHES  
NATIONAL GRASSROOTS ADVOCACY PROGRAM TO PRESERVE  
FUNDING FOR CANCER RESEARCH**

**Husband's Futile Battle with Pancreatic Cancer Inspires St. Paul's Nancy Anderson  
to Mobilize Regional Support for an Increase in Cancer Research Funding**

Los Angeles, CA – In response to the Bush Administration's proposed FY 2007 budget, which would cut federal funding for cancer research to the National Institutes of Health by over \$40 million, the Pancreatic Cancer Action Network (PanCAN) announced today that it has launched a national grassroots advocacy campaign through its 87 volunteer-driven Team Hope affiliate sites to voice objections to the proposed budget cuts. The grassroots effort will also urge local legislators and civic leaders to step forward and support increased awareness, additional funding and supportive legislation for cancer research.

Through a competitive application process, five lead advocates were selected from California, New York, Arizona, Minnesota and Ohio to spearhead PanCAN's efforts. Each of the new leaders has had a personal experience with pancreatic cancer, including St. Paul resident, Nancy J. Peterson Anderson, who lost her husband in July, 2004, just a short while after he was diagnosed with end-stage pancreatic cancer. But instead of becoming bitter that her husband's prognosis might have been different if there were an early diagnostic tool that could have detected his cancer earlier, or a treatment that might have knocked it into remission, Anderson focuses her energies on raising public support for the research needed to find a cure for this especially deadly form of cancer. "Nancy is a natural as an advocate, and we are delighted to have her with us. Her first-person experience with fighting this disease will be a tremendous force in influencing our key state and local officials and civic leaders to commit to supporting increased funding for cancer research," stated Julie Fleshman, PanCAN's President and CEO. "Like her colleagues in other states, Nancy will work closely with our Team Hope

members to grow our advocacy numbers person-by-person, district-by-district, state-by-state.”

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“More than 15,000 people participated in Team Hope events last year,” continued Fleshman, “so we’re confident that Nancy and our other lead advocates have the outreach support they’ll need to insure that every member of the House and Senate will know, when election time nears, how important the issue of pancreatic cancer is to their constituents.”

“We simply cannot afford to reduce funding for cancer research, now or at any time in the foreseeable future,” explained Elizabeth Thompson, PanCAN’s Director of Research and Scientific Affairs. “This is the time to urgently push forward, when there are so many promising therapies in development and millions of lives at stake. Without at least sustaining 2005-2006 funding levels, existing research pipelines could collapse and there would be little opportunity or incentive for new development.”

Though scientists have developed relatively effective treatments and drug therapies for many types of common cancers, there is still no early detection method or effective treatment for pancreatic cancer, the fourth most common type of cancer. In 2006, experts project that more than 33,000 new cases of pancreatic cancer will be identified and almost as many casualties will result.

“The inability to detect pancreatic cancer early and having so few treatment options unfortunately feeds the public’s perception of a diagnosis of pancreatic cancer as a virtual death sentence,” continued Fleshman. “With a local advocacy element in place, we will have a far stronger opportunity to spread our more positive message of hope for a cure in the halls of Congress.” Within the scientific community, PanCAN is highly regarded as the sole provider of Career Development grants, monies which entice and encourage research scientists to the field of pancreatic cancer research. It was an early PanCAN Career Development grant which supported one scientist’s discovery of a mouse model for pancreatic cancer research, an exciting breakthrough which makes other groundbreaking discoveries both possible and probable.

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Next week, bolstered by representatives of the new grassroots campaign in attendance, Pan CAN will jointly campaign for cancer research funding on Capitol Hill April 25-26, 2006 with One Voice Against Cancer (OVAC, a 57-member cancer coalition), the National Coalition for Cancer Research, the Cancer Leadership Coalition and the AdHoc Group for Medical Research.

In 2005, as part of a highly visible and cohesive educational campaign, PanCAN representatives made more than 150 visits to Congressional offices, and met on a weekly basis with Congressional and Senate members and staff on budget and appropriations issues related to cancer research funding. In a separate endeavor to accelerate research efforts, PanCAN recently partnered with C-Three (the Colorectal Cancer Coalition) to train and develop research advocates in gastrointestinal cancer, who will represent the two agencies at upcoming meetings with the Specialized Programs of Research Excellence (SPORES), Clinical Trials Working Groups, Southwestern Oncology Group (SWOG), Eastern Clinical Oncology Group (ECOG), the Food and Drug Administration and others.
